

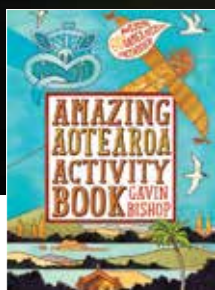

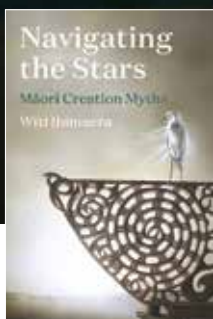

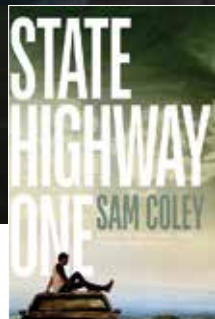
Amazing Aotearoa Activity Book

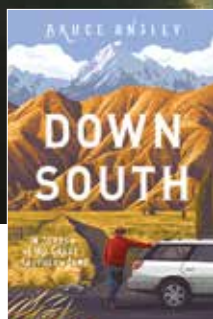
Navigating the Stars: Māori Creation Myths

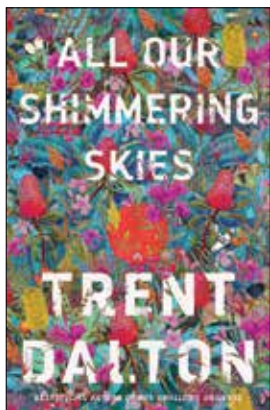

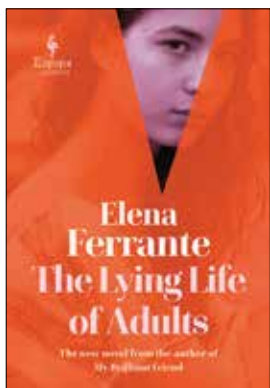

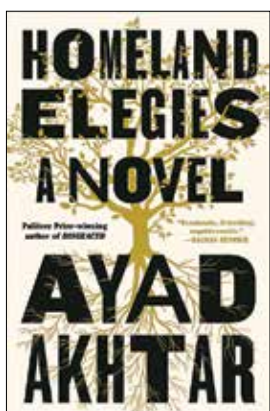
All Our Shimmering Skies

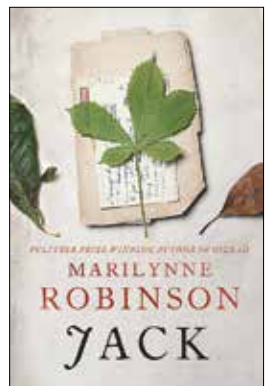
Just Like You

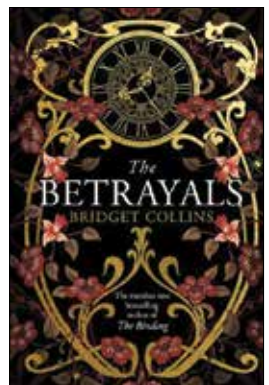

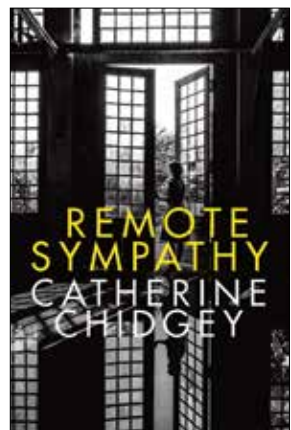

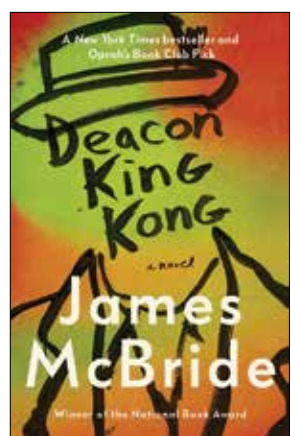
At Montverre, an exclusive academy tucked away in the

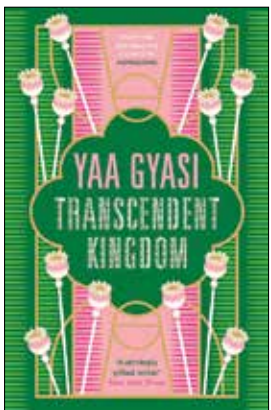


Addressed To Greta

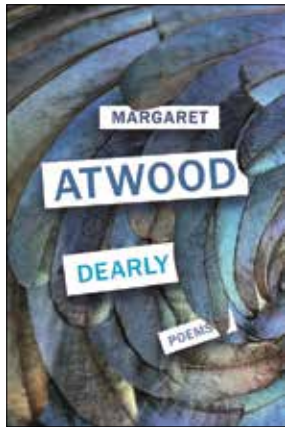


Nouns, Verbs, Etc

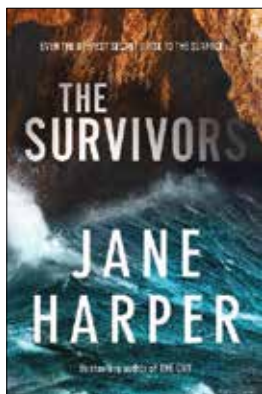

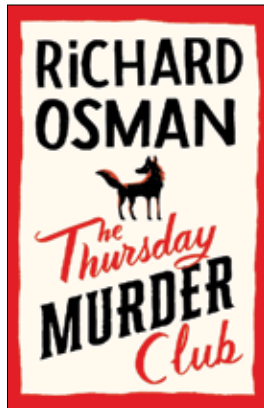
The Kingdom

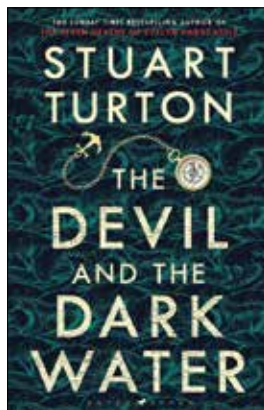


The Thursday Murder Club
