


Spring (v3 Seasonal Quartet) ALI SMITH (HAMISH HAMILTON) PB \$34,00


### Live a Little HOWARD JACOBSON (JONATHAN CAPE) PB \$35.00 OUT IN IUL


# Attraction RUBY PORTER (TEXT) PB NZ TITLE \$37.00
