
The Passenger CORMAC MCCARTHY (PICADOR) HB \$49.99


Stella Maris





and strength of will.




The Marriage Portrait MAGGIE O'FARRELL (TINDER PRESS)

In 1838 Frédéric Chopin and George Sand travel to a monastery in Mallorca, to live a simple life after the wildness of their Paris days. Heady with the delicious scent of the Mediterranean, this is a story about breaking convention, about love, and about men and women and the cruelty they impart on one another.



Poor People With Money DOMINIC HOEY (PENGUIN NZ) PB NZTITLE \$37.00




Kawai: For Such a Time As This MONTY SOUTAR (DAVID BATEMAN) PB NZ TITLE \$39.99

Shrines of Gaiety KATE ATKINSON (DOUBLEDAY) PB \$37.00




## The Romantic WILLIAM BOYD (VIKING PENGUIN) PB \$37.00


#### Isaac and the Egg BOBBY PALMER (HEADLINE) PB \$37.99





'Always italicise foreign words', a friend of the author was advised. In her first book of poetry, Alice Te Punga Somerville does just that. With wit and anger, sadness and






# The Pain Tourist PAUL CLEAVE (UPSTART) PB NZ TITLE \$37.99 OUT IN NOV







As Long As The Lemon Trees Grow ZOULFA KATOUH (BLOOMSBURY) PB \$18.99


Salama was a student when cries for freedom broke out in Syria. Now Salama volunteers at a hospital, helping ▶
