




My Sister and Other Lovers **ESTHER FREUD** (BLOOMSBURY) **PB \$36.99** OUT IN JUL


Saraswati **GURNAIK JOHAL** (SERPENT'S TAIL) **PB \$37.99** OUT IN JUN


The Emperor of Gladness **OCEAN VUONG** (JONATHAN CAPE) **PB** \$38.00


Ripeness SARAH MOSS (PICADOR) **PB \$37.99** OUT IN JUN

Ripeness is an extraordinary novel about familial love and the communities we create, about migration and new beginnings, and about what it is to have somewhere to belong.




The Pretender JO HARKIN (BLOOMSBURY) PB \$36.99

In the summer of 1980, astrophysics professor Joan Goodwin begins training to be an astronaut at Houston's Johnson Space Center, alongside an exceptional group of fellow candidates. As the new astronauts prepare for their first flights, Joan finds a passion and a love she never imagined, and begins to question everything she believes about her place in the observable universe. Then, in December 1984, on mission STS-LR9, everything changes in an instant.



Theft ABDULRAZAK GURNAH (BLOOMSBURY) PB \$36.99

In 1990s Zanzibar, three very different young people - Karim, Fauzia and Badar – are coming of age, and dreaming of great possibilities in their young nation. Even when a shattering false accusation sends Badar away, Karim and Fauzia refuse to abandon their friend. But as the three of them take their first steps in love, infatuation, work and parenthood, their bond is tested - and Karim is tempted into a betraval that will change their lives forever. 
Beautyland MARIE-HELENE **BERTINO (VINTAGE) PB \$26.00** OUT IN JUN

Her mission is clear: she must report on the oddities of humankind. Adina's perceptive and funny observations offer a quietly joyful view of life on Earth.

Yeva is a scientist who scours the country's forests, trying to breed rare snails while her relatives urge her to settle down. Yeva already dates plenty of men, entertaining Westerners who come to Ukraine on guided romance tours believing they'll find docile brides. Nastia and Solomiya are also entangled in the marriage industry. So begins the journey of a lifetime: three angry women, a truckful of kidnapped bachelors, and a last-of-his-kind snail with one final shot at perpetuating his species.




Parallel Lines **EDWARD ST AUBYN** (JONATHAN CAPE) **PB** \$38.00

Sebastian is in treatment following a breakdown that has left him with a fragile hold on reality. His therapist, Martin, also faces challenges, including his adopted daughter Olivia's tenuous relationship with her biological mother. Olivia, meanwhile, is producing a radio series on natural disasters, which itself seems to be running parallel to the events unfolding in her personal life. Over a year, their fates collide in outrageous and poignant ways, revealing their destinies in a new light.



The Book of Records MADELEINE THIEN (GRANTA) PB \$37.99

Lina and her father have arrived at an enclave called the Sea. Pasts and futures collide in this mysterious, shape-shifting building made of time. Lina befriends her neighbours: a Iewish scholar in 17th-century Amsterdam; a philosopher in 1930s Germany; and a poet of Tang-Dynasty China. Under the tutelage of these great thinkers, Lina confronts her family's tragic past. This extraordinary novel explores the role of fate in history, our search for home, and the place of faith in our world.




Objects of Desire **NEIL BLACKMORE** (HUTCHINSON HEINEMANN)


The Savage, Noble Death of Babs Dionne **RON CURRIE (ATLANTIC) PB \$36.99** OUT IN JUL

America, América: A New History of the New World GREG GRANDIN (TORVA) PB \$45.00



The New Geography of Innovation MEHRAN GUL (HARPERCOLLINS) PB \$39.99 OUT IN JUL

For 50 years, Silicon Valley has been spinning out new technologies and developing fast-growing, high value, billion plus dollar tech companies. These companies established 'the Valley' as the centre for the most rapid creation of wealth in human history. But now its secrets are spreading elsewhere. In this book Mehran Gul, a World Economic Forum expert on the emergence of new generation big technology, traces the shift that is ultimately changing the landscape of the world's economy.



Exile Economics: What Happens if Globalisation Fails BEN CHU (BASIC BOOKS) PB \$39.99

A new vision is vying to replace globalisation. This vision - Exile Economics – entails a rejection of interdependence, a downgrading of multilateral collaboration and a striving for greater national self-sufficiency. The supporters of this new order argue it will establish genuine security, prosperity and peace. But is this promise achievable?
